History of the Proceeding

The Director of the Oregon Department of Consumer and Business Services (director) commenced this administrative proceeding, pursuant to Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 731.256, to take enforcement action against Robert E. Guyett (Guyett).

On 11/12/04, the director notified the party that they were entitled to a hearing pursuant to ORS 183.415.

The director did not receive a request for a hearing, and did not hold a hearing because the director determined that the record of the proceeding proved a *prima facie* case and no further evidence was needed.

Therefore, the director now makes the following final decision in this proceeding.

Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law

Licensing Information

Guyett has been licensed in Oregon as a nonresident insurance agent since 4/24/03. Guyett's last recorded residence and business addresses are located in Yuma, Arizona.

Agent Not Licensed in Resident State

Guyett is subject to enforcement action pursuant to ORS 744.063(1)(a) in one instance because of the following circumstances. ORS 744.063(1)(a) requires a person licensed in Oregon as a nonresident insurance agent to also be licensed and in good standing in the person's state of residence as a resident insurance producer. At all relevant times, Guyett was a resident of Arizona. On 5/31/04, Guyett's Arizona resident agent license expired. Therefore, Guyett has not qualified for an Oregon nonresident insurance agent license since 5/31/04.

Order

Pursuant to ORS 744.074(1), Guyett's Oregon nonresident insurance agent license is revoked on the date of this order.

Notice of Right to Judicial Review

The party may have the right to appeal the order to the Oregon Court of Appeals pursuant to ORS 183.480 and 183.482. If a party wants to appeal the order, the party must file a petition for judicial review with the Court of Appeals within 60 days from the date this order was served on the party. If the order was personally delivered to a party, then the date of service is the day the party received the order. If the order was mailed to a party, then the date of service is the day the order was mailed to the party, not the day the party received the order. If a party does not file a petition for judicial review within the 60-day time period, then the party will lose the right to appeal this order. If a party appeals the order, the party should also send a copy of the petition to the Insurance Division.
