As a physician in Lane County, I support the pending transaction between Centene and Agate Resources. In 1996, most of the physicians in our county banded together to fund Lipa (which became Agate) in order to create an organization that could best care for Oregon Health Plan members in our community. Our locally owned organization has served us and our patients well over the past two decades; it has been a phenomenal community resource that has enabled us to provide excellent care.

But the complexity and demands of delivering high quality and efficient health care have changed over time and many of us now realize that we must evolve if we are to bring needed value to our health care plan and continue doing the best possible job of serving our members. A relationship with Centene provides us with this opportunity.

It is crucial that Trillium remain a community-based organization in order to best respond to the needs of our members. Trillium's community connection will continue after Agate's ownership transitions to Centene for three reasons. Firstly, because Trillium's community structure and committees are mandated by Oregon statutes. Secondly, because Centene's corporate culture is to support independence among its various state plans. I believe that by allowing Centene to acquire Trillium, Lane County will have the opportunity to continue evolving our CCO and significantly outperform all other CCO's in Oregon to our members' benefit. I urge you to support this transaction so that we may bring this opportunity to our community.
