



Are you interested in serving on the Oregon Prescription Drug Affordability Board?

The Prescription Drug Affordability Board (PDAB) is made up of individuals with expertise in health care economics and clinical medicine to fill two future vacancies. The board encourages applicants with knowledge and experience in clinical patient care or prescription drug payment systems. PDAB consists of eight members appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Oregon Senate. Members serve four-year terms and may seek reappointment. The board's purpose is to protect Oregon residents, state and local governments, commercial health plans, health care providers, pharmacies, and others in the health care system from the high cost of prescription drugs.

Candidates should complete the application through [Workday](#), and include the following:

- Short biography
- Supplemental questions
- Demographic questions
- Resume/CV (upload PDF)
- Background check questions
- Voluntary disclosures
- Complete Workday application task

Residency and background requirements: Board members must be Oregon residents with expertise in health care economics and clinical medicine. They may not be an employee of, a board member of, or a consultant to a prescription drug manufacturer or a trade association of manufacturers.

Time commitment: Board members contribute approximately 15 hours per month. This includes attending virtual board meetings held on the third Wednesday of each month using the Zoom platform. Board members receive a state iPad to use for email and document review.

Board functions: The board carries out its legislative mandate through affordability reviews and policy recommendations. Each year, it may identify up to nine drugs and may identify at least one insulin product that may create affordability challenges for health care systems or high out-of-pocket costs for patients in Oregon. The board selects the drugs based on criteria in [OAR 925.200.0010](#) and [OAR 925.200.0020](#) using information provided by the [Drug Price Transparency \(DPT\) Program](#) and other sources. The board reports its determinations about prescription drugs and insulin affordability to the Oregon Legislature and provides policy recommendations each December.
